News Highlights:

- Starting March 23, the FDA will classify **insulin as a biological drug** instead of as a **chemical drug**, which will open the door for approval of "biosimilar" insulin products. This move is expected to make the insulin market more competitive, leading to **lower prices**. - This week, the Japanese government announced it will begin clinical trials testing HIV drugs to treat the new coronavirus. Drugs are chosen for testing that may treat a number of RNA viruses, which include viruses that cause Ebola, hepatitis C, and SARS, HIV, and the new coronavirus.

- The U.S. FDA authorized marketing of the first test to detect "Fragile X" (FXS) syndrome, which is caused by a mutation on the FMR1 gene on the X chromosome. It is associated with developmental delays, learning disabilities, social and behavioral issues, and autism spectrum disorder. One in 4,000 males and 1 in 8,000 females in the U.S. have FXS, and it is the most common known cause of inherited developmental delay and intellectual disability.

- ZDNet reports that almost half of Windows-connected medical devices are likely to be vulnerable to a Microsoft vulnerability called "BlueKeep," which affects remote connections to some of the older Windows operating systems (such as Windows 7 and Windows Server 2008). - A WPLN/NPR/Kaiser Health News investigation found that it is not just hospitals but also **emergency room physician-staffing firms** that have been **suing hundreds of patients in the Nashville area** for unpaid medical bills. While patients try to work out payment arrangements, some are faced with wage garnishment and bankruptcy. - In his "State of the State" address, California Governor Gavin Newsom focused almost entirely on the problem of homelessness and the need for improved mental health care. - While Director of the Office of the National Coordinator for Health Information Technology David Rucker, policy crafter Jared Kushner, and tech executives like Google Health chief David Feinberg push for a rule allowing

Rifts among Big Tech, hospitals, current EHR providers, and consumer groups have temporarily postponed the release of the rule.

An official at the U.S. Centers for Disease Control (CDC) said that it's possible, "even likely" that community spread may eventually happen.
