- U.S. Food and Drug Administration approved a new drug regimen of Opdivo (nivolumab) in combination with Yervoy (ipilimumab) for the first-line treatment of adults with malignant pleural mesothelioma that cannot be removed by surgery. About 20,000 Americans are diagnosed each year with mesothelioma, a life-threatening cancer of the lungs' lining caused by inhaling asbestos fibers.

- The heart monitoring feature on the Apple Watch may lead to unnecessary health care visits, according to a Mayo Clinic study. The study revealed that only around 10 percent of people who saw a doctor at the Mayo Clinic after noticing an abnormal pulse reading on their watch were eventually diagnosed with a cardiac condition. - The U.S. FDA issued labeling recommendations for breast implants to improve patient understanding of health risks. These include breast implant-associated anaplastic large cell lymphoma (BIA-ALCL) and systemic symptoms commonly referred to as breast implant illness (BII) that some patients attribute to their implants, which can include fatigue, "brain fog," muscle or joint pain and rash.

- A newly identified genetic factor allows adult skin to repair itself like the skin of a newborn, holds potential for creating better skin wound treatments as well as preventing some of the aging process in skin. Washington State University researchers identified a factor in the skin of baby mice controlling hair follicle formation. When it was activated in adult mice, their skin was able to heal wounds without scarring, grow fur, and could even make goose bumps.

- Aarhus University researchers discovered that **Parkinson's disease** can start in two distinct parts of the body. For some patients, the disease starts in the intestines and spreads from there to the brain through neural connections. For others, the disease starts in the brain and spreads to the intestines and other organs such as the heart. Researchers used advanced PET and MRI imaging techniques to examine people with Parkinson's disease as well as people who have not yet been diagnosed but have a high risk of developing the disease. - Associated Press reported that there was an overall dip in **military suicides** during the first three months of 2020 compared with the same time last year. But when the **pandemic** hit in the spring, the numbers increased by as much as 20%. Senior army leaders say they've seen about a 30% jump in active duty suicides so far this year and that they are looking at shortening combat deployments.

- The U.S. House Oversight Committee, armed with thousands of pages of internal company documents, questioned **six drug companies** (including Mallinckrodt, Amgen, Novartis, Celgene, Bristol Myers Squibb and Teva) about their **drug pricing** practices. Rep. **Katie Porter** (CA) grilled the CEO of Celgene over the **price gouging** of multiple myeloma drug <u>Revlimid</u> (click for drug reviews.)

"You received half a million dollars, personally, just by tripling the price of Revlimid," Porter said. "To recap here, the drug didn't get any better. The cancer patients didn't get any better. You just got better at making money." Porter noted that taxpayers spent \$3.3 billion on Revlimid for Medicare beneficiaries. This Kaiser Health News article includes a 5-minute video of Rep. - Fecal transplants could one day be used to restore cognitive decline among the elderly. A new study shows how fecal transplants from older to younger mice altered their gut microbiome, which in turn impacted their spatial learning and memory. The research team hope the reverse could also be true, and one day used as a therapy to restore cognitive function in older people. University of East Anglia, the University of Florence and the Quadram Institute conducted the study.

Cancer chemotherapy changes the function of cells that repair heart injury, researchers at The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio (UT Health San Antonio) discovered. The journal *PLOS ONE* published the results Sept. 22 during Childhood Cancer Awareness Month.

- A University of Rochester Medical Center study suggests that **past exposures to the common cold** may provide some protection from covid-19. They also found that SARS-CoV-2 invokes **memory B cells**, long-lived immune cells that detect pathogens for a long time. This means COVID-19 survivors could have long-lasting immunity to the virus.

- More than 7,000 **minks** at ranches in Utah have died from COVID-19, forcing nine sites in three counties to quarantine. Minks seem particularly susceptible to COVID-19, likely because of a protein in their lungs, the ACE2 receptor, which is also present in humans.

- The U.S. FDA has widened its investigation of Oxford/Astrazeneca's vaccine trial, which remains halted in the U.S. While other vaccine developers have used human adenoviruses for coronavirus vaccines, the Oxford researchers chose to use an adenovirus found in chimpanzees. Reuters reviewed other vaccine studies that used the chimpanzee adenovirus. The type of review being conducted by the FDA is generally intended to scrutinize raw data for other side effects.

- Patients who are still recovering from COVID-19 are increasingly being treated at "post-COVID clinics". About 10% of treated U.S. COVID patients may have longer-running effects, said Dr. Zijian Chen, medical director of the Center for Post-COVID Care at Mount Sinai, which has enrolled 400 patients so far. Other similar clinics have been launched at the University of California-San Francisco, Stanford University Medical Center and the University of Pennsylvania.



- Social isolation worsens the effects of **Alzheimer's disease**, with an increase in hyperactivity levels (including gross and fine motor movements), and an increase in the asymmetric atrophy of the hippocampus, a brain area central to memory. The study was published in a special edition of *Frontiers in Psychiatry*.

- Drexel University researchers are using a new technique for spotting patterns in the **genetic sequence of SARS-CoV-2** and how it has **mutated**, suggesting that there are at least 8 to 14 slightly different versions of the virus infecting people in America.
