# Health News: October 11, 2020

- Scientists may have discovered a new treatment for **tinnitus**: "zapping" the **tongue** with **electrical shocks** that are not painful but "feel a bit like pop rocks candy fizzing in the mouth." In a study, subjects wore a tongue device along with headphones that delivered a targeted treatment to the auditory system of the brain. Tinnitus, or ringing in the ears, can be extremely bothersome, affecting 10 to 15% of the population. There is no approved drug or device for the condition. Some patients have treated the **anxiety** caused by chronic tinnitus by using medications like <u>lorazepam</u> (click for reviews) or <u>Xanax</u>.

- California Governor Gavin Newsom vetoed a bill (SB 980) that would have established strong privacy protections for genetic data collected by direct-to-consumer (DTC) genetic testing companies like 23andMe and Ancestry. Many consumers don't realize that DNA information collected through these companies is largely not protected by HIPPA or other laws. The bill had bipartisan support by the California legislature. Newsom explained that his veto was due to concern about the law's potential effect on mandatory reporting of COVID-19 test results to the state; most likely the bill will have to be fine-tuned before a version is signed into law.

- eResearchTechnology (ERT), a Philadelphia company that sells software used in hundreds of clinical trials in North America, Europe, and Asia, including coronavirus-related studies, was hit by a ransomware attack that has slowed some of those trials over the past two weeks. While clinical trial patients were never at risk, the attack forced trial researchers to track their participants with pen and paper. - The **U.S. Food and Drug Administration** and its regulatory counterpart in **Mexico** broadened and enhanced a partnership to work together on **food safety** in both countries. "U.S. consumers rely on imports from Mexico for much of the **fresh fruit and vegetables** that they eat as well as other foods. Our enhanced food safety partnership with our Mexican colleagues will play an important role in helping each country's respective efforts to create a modernized food safety regulatory framework, " said FDA Commissioner Stephen Hahn. About one-third of all food imported into the U.S. is from Mexico.



- A five-year Norwegian study of patients born between 1936 and 1942 found that exercise regimen intensity is not linked to all-cause mortality risk in older adults. The study, published in *BMJ*, includes a linked opinion piece by the study authors: "It's never too late for older adults to start exercising." The authors explain limitations of their study, such as the serious challenge of finding a suitable control group, since people signing up for lifestyle-related studies are in general healthy and/or very motivated to change lifestyle. They emphasize that the study did reveal larger health benefits in those that undertook mainly high intensity exercise when compared to those that mainly undertook exercise with moderate intensity. Finally, the study showed that a yearly checkup that includes a focus on the importance of physical activity can motivate older adults to stay physically active. Study summary:

- What kind of chair do you use in your home office? Some experts say that the trendy "stability ball' may not have significant health benefits and in fact has some drawbacks, including discomfort and the risk of falls. A physical therapist conducted a study comparing balance balls with desk chairs and found that the ball did not reduce lower back pain but did improve endurance in muscles that control forward and backward movement. Many therapists recommend that we vary posture during the day; this could mean switching between a traditional chair, stability ball, backless stool and standing.

- An inexpensive paint-on dental treatment that lets cavities be treated without drilling is rapidly gaining momentum nationwide as the cavity treatment of choice for patients who can't easily get a filling, such as the very young or the very old. Silver diamine fluoride (SDF) has been used safely in other countries for decades but has a cosmetic downside in that it permanently turns the decayed area black. However, there are methods of covering the spot (at an extra cost). Another plus: dental hygienists can be trained to administer the treatment, which means more patients can receive the care onsite in nursing homes or in mobile clinics.

#### **COVID-19 News**

- President Donald Trump was released from Walter Reed Medical Hospital after receiving treatment with an experimental therapy, "REGN-CoV-2." While he credits the drug for the improvement in his health, doctors cannot discern, however, if the Regeneron drug is the reason. He has taken two other drugs (newly authorized remdesivir and the steroid dexamethasone). In Phase 3 clinical trials, the drug is considered to be an "antibody cocktail" because it is a combination of two antibodies that target the spike protein of SARS-COv-2. In a press release dated 9/29/2020, Regeneron said that its first results of testing on 275 patients demonstrate a greater decrease in viral load, reduction in symptoms, and hospital visits. Eli Lilly has also developed its own antibody treatment. Both companies are applying to the FDA for Emergency Use Authorizations (EUA) for their drugs. - Two separate studies reported by the AAAS (American Association for the Advancement of Science) have found that **antibodies remain in both blood and saliva** in hundreds of patients with COVID-19 for at least 3 months after symptom onset.
